DIANA AVIV, President and Chief Executive Officer, Independent Sector

Diana Aviv, President and CEO of Independent Sector, served as Executive Director of the Panel on the Nonprofit Sector; the Panel was convened by IS at the encouragement of the Senate Finance Committee. Previously, she was Vice President for public policy of the Jewish Federations of North America. In 2010, President Obama appointed Aviv to the White House Council for Community Solutions. Aviv serves on the board of governors of the Partnership for Public Service and the National Commission on Civic Investment in Public Education, and the Outcomes and Effective Practices Portal. She is on the advisory boards of the Peter G. Peterson Foundation, the International Center for Not-for-Profit Law and the Comptroller General's Advisory Board at the Government Accountability Office (GAO). Aviv graduated with a B.S.W. from the University of Witwatersrand and received a M.A. in social work at Columbia University.

MELODY BARNES, Assistant to the President for Domestic Policy and Director, Domestic Policy Council, The White House

Melody Barnes is the President's Domestic Policy Adviser and the Director of the Domestic Policy Council, which coordinates the domestic policy-making process in the White House. Before joining the White House, Barnes served as the Senior Domestic Policy Advisor to President Obama's campaign. Prior to joining the campaign, she was the Executive Vice President for Policy at the Center for American Progress. From 1995 to 2003, she served as Chief Counsel to Sen. Edward M. Kennedy on the Senate Judiciary Committee. In those capacities, and as Director of Legislative Affairs for the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and assistant counsel to the U.S. House of Representatives Judiciary Subcommittee on Civil and Constitutional Rights, she worked extensively on civil rights and voting rights, women's health, religious liberties, and commercial law. Barnes received her bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and received her law degree from the University of Michigan. She began her career as an attorney with Shearman & Sterling in New York City, and is a member of both the New York State Bar Association and the District of Columbia Bar Association.

MARK L. BODDEN, Rudin Family Foundations

Mark L. Bodden is Vice President/Program Director at the Rudin Family Foundations. Previously, Bodden was the Managing Director of Binder and Binder, a national law firm handling Social Security Disability. He led the corporate giving program at Philip Morris Companies (presently known as Altria) and has over twenty years of public policy experience, having worked in Washington, D.C. and in Albany, New York. Bodden is currently on the Board of Philanthropy New York and the Edwin Gould Academy,

and serves on the Dean's Council at the Steinhardt School of Culture, Education and Human Development at NYU. He is a graduate of the School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell University and attended the National Law Center at George Washington University. He is a Fellow at the Public Affairs Institute in Washington, having completed its three-year program for Public Affairs Executives. He served on the adjunct faculty at the Wagner Graduate School of Public Service at New York University and is currently a member of the adjunct faculty at Baruch College.

RICHARD BROWN, Vice President, Philanthropy, American Express Company

Richard Brown is a Vice President of Philanthropy at American Express where he oversees the company's domestic giving programs under the Historic Preservation & Conservation and Leadership giving themes. Previously at the Goldman Sachs Foundation, Brown was the Corporate Secretary and Program Manager responsible for board relations, venture philanthropy, and program development. He has also held leadership positions in corporate philanthropy at AT&T Wireless, the Toys R Us Children's Fund, the Texaco Foundation and Altria. Brown currently serves on the STRIVE Board of Directors, is a member of the Council on Foundation's Corporate Committee, the past president and current treasurer of the Foundation of the Westchester Clubmen, a Jobs First NY board member and a former board member of Philanthropy New York. Brown is also a trustee of the Lincoln Fund, a Foundation that supports a wide-range of community-based programs in New York City. A graduate of Syracuse University, Brown received a MS in Organizational Change Management at The Milano Graduate School at New School University in New York.

LONNIE G. BUNCH III, Director, National Museum of African American History and Culture, The Smithsonian

Lonnie G. Bunch, III is the Director of the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture. Previously, he served as the President of the Chicago Historical Society and Associate Director for Curatorial Affairs at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History. Prior to his time at the National Museum of American History, Bunch served as the Curator of History and Program Manager for the California Afro-American Museum in Los Angeles. Bunch has held numerous teaching positions at universities across the country, including the American University in Washington, D.C., the University of Massachusetts in Dartmouth and the George Washington University in Washington, D.C. Bunch has served on the advisory boards of the American Association of Museums and the American Association of State and Local History. Among his many awards, he was appointed by President George W. Bush to the Commission for the Preservation of the White House in 2002 and reappointed by President Barack Obama in 2009. In 2005, Bunch was named one of the 100 most influential museum professionals of the 20th century by the American Association of Museums. Bunch received his undergraduate and graduate degrees from the American University in Washington, D.C.

KENNETH I. CHENAULT, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, American Express Company

Kenneth I. Chenault is Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of American Express Company. Chenault joined the company in September 1981 as Director of Strategic Planning and since then, has served as President of the Consumer Card Group, President of Travel Related Services (TRS), Vice Chairman, President and Chief Operating Officer. He assumed his current responsibilities as Chairman and Chief

Executive Officer in 2001. Before coming to American Express, Chenault was a management consultant with Bain & Co. and an attorney with Rogers & Wells. Chenault serves on the boards of American Express and several other corporate and nonprofit organizations, including IBM, The Procter & Gamble Company, the Arthur Ashe Institute for Urban Health, the National Center on Addiction & Substance Abuse at Columbia University, the Smithsonian Institution's Advisory Council for the National Museum of African American History & Culture, and the World Trade Center Memorial Foundation. He also is on the boards and serves as Co-Chairman of the Partnership for New York City, The Business Council and the Business Roundtable. Chenault has received a variety of awards for his public service leadership, including the Phoenix House Public Service Award, the Corporate Responsibility Award from the International Rescue Committee and the Wall Street Rising Leadership Award. In addition, he is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Chenault holds a JD from Harvard Law School, a BA in history from Bowdoin College, and he has received a number of honorary degrees from several universities.

CHERYL DORSEY, President, Echoing Green

Cheryl Dorsey is President of Echoing Green, a pioneer in the social entrepreneurship movement. Dorsey received an Echoing Green Fellowship in 1992 and launched The Family Van, a community-based mobile health unit that provides basic health care and outreach services to at-risk residents of inner-city Boston neighborhoods. Dorsey served as a White House Fellow and Special Assistant to the U.S. Secretary of Labor from 1997-1998, Special Assistant to the Director of the Women's Bureau of the U.S. Labor Department from 1998-1999, and Transition Team Member of the Innovation and Civil Society subgroup of the Technology, Innovation, and Government Reform Policy Working Group from 2008-2009. Dorsey serves on several boards including the Harvard Board of Overseers, the SEED Foundation, and Northeast Bank, and is the Vice Chair for the President's Commission on White House Fellowships. In 2009, Dorsey was named one of "America's Best Leaders" by *US News & World Report* and the Center for Public Leadership at Harvard Kennedy School, and in 2010, she was listed as one of *The Nonprofit Times'* "Power and Influence Top 50." Dorsey received her Bachelor's degree in History and Science magna cum laude with highest honors from Harvard-Radcliffe Colleges, her medical degree from Harvard Medical School, and her Master's in Public Policy from Harvard Kennedy School. She completed her pediatric residency at Children's National Medical Center in Washington, D.C.

JOSHUA DUBOIS, Special Assistant to the President and Executive Director, The White House Office of Faith-based and Neighborhood Partnerships

Joshua DuBois is Special Assistant to President Obama and Executive Director of the White House Office of Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships. In this capacity, DuBois helps direct the Obama Administration's engagement of faith-based and other nonprofit organizations around the country. One of President Obama's longest serving aides, DuBois previously served in then-Senator Obama's legislative office, and he led the Religious Affairs Department for the 2008 Obama presidential campaign. DuBois is a noted expert on the intersection of religion and public life, and his work has been profiled in *The New York Times*, *Washington Post*, *Wall Street Journal*, CNN and elsewhere. Previously he worked on Capitol Hill, and was an Associate Pastor at a small church in Cambridge, Massachusetts. He received a Masters in Public Affairs from Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School and a Bachelor's degree from Boston University.

AIMÉE EUBANKS DAVIS, Executive Vice President of People, Community, and Diversity, Teach for America

Aimée Eubanks Davis serves as Executive Vice President of People, Community, and Diversity at Teach For America. Previously, she served as Teach For America's Chief People Officer overseeing Human Assets. Eubanks Davis joined Teach For America in 2002 as Vice President of New Site Development and later moved to the regional operations team, where she managed Teach For America's executive directors. Before joining Teach For America, Eubanks Davis was a Program Officer at The Breakthrough Collaborative (formerly Summerbridge National) and, prior to that position, she led the Summerbridge New Orleans site to become one of the most successful sites in The Breakthrough Collaborative. Eubanks Davis, a graduate of Mt. Holyoke College, was a 1995 Teach For America corps member and taught sixth grade social studies and language arts in New Orleans.

PAULA GAVIN, Chief Executive Officer, National Urban Fellows

In June 2007, Paula Gavin was selected to become the President of National Urban Fellows, Inc., a premier leadership development and diversity organization in America. Previously, Gavin was the founding Executive Director of the New York City Center for Charter School Excellence, a nonprofit organization that promotes the development of charter schools. Gavin served as President and Chief Executive Officer of the YMCA of Greater New York from 1990 to 2004. Prior to her position with the YMCA, Gavin held multiple executive positions with AT&T before being named Vice President of Network Operations. A graduate of the University of Delaware, Gavin is a Board Member of the YMCA of Haiti, the National Jazz Museum in Harlem, and the Association for a Better New York.

JONATHAN GREENBLATT, Special Assistant to the President and Director, Office of Social Innovation and Civic Participation, The White House

Jonathan Greenblatt serves as Special Assistant to the President and Director of the Office of Social Innovation and Civic Participation. Prior to joining the White House, Greenblatt led the Impact Economy Initiative of the Aspen Institute Program on Philanthropy and Social Innovation. He is the Founder and former President of All for Good (Our Good Works - OGW), the open source, web-based initiative to engage more Americans in service. Greenblatt is the former CEO of GOOD Worldwide and the co-founder of Ethos Brands, the business that launched Ethos Water, the premium bottled water that helps children around the world get clean water. Greenblatt served as Vice President of Global Consumer Products at Starbucks Coffee Company following its acquisition of Ethos in 2005, and he joined the board of directors of the Starbucks Foundation. He served as an aide in the Clinton White House and was on the Technology and Innovation working group of the Obama-Biden Presidential Transition team. Greenblatt is a Henry Crown Fellow of the Aspen Institute and was appointed to the faculty at the Anderson School of Management at UCLA in 2006, where he taught social entrepreneurship. He graduated *cum laude* from Tufts University and earned an MBA from the Kellogg School of Management at Northwestern University.

VALERIE B. JARRETT, Senior Advisor to the President and Chair, The White House Council on Women and Girls

Valerie B. Jarrett is a Senior Advisor to President Barack Obama. She is also the Chair of the White House Council on Women and Girls. Prior to joining the Obama Administration, she was the Chief Executive Officer of The Habitat Company. She also served as Co-Chair of the Obama-Biden Presidential Transition Team, and Senior Advisor to Obama's presidential campaign. Ms. Jarrett has held positions in both the public and private sector, including the Chairman of the Chicago Transit Board, the Commissioner of Planning and Development for the City of Chicago, and Deputy Chief of Staff for Mayor Richard M. Daley. She also practiced law with two private law firms. Jarrett also served as a director of corporate and not for profit boards, including Chairman of the Board of the Chicago Stock Exchange, Director of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, and Chairman of the University of Chicago Medical Center Board of Trustees. Jarrett received her B.A. from Stanford University in 1978 and her J.D. from the University of Michigan Law School in 1981.

KIRK KRAMER, Partner, The Bridgespan Group

Kirk Kramer joined the Bridgespan Group in 2005 as a partner in the Boston office and currently serves as the head of the Leadership and Organizational Development practice area. He has over 30 years of global for-profit and nonprofit consulting experience in strategy, organization, and operations. His work in the nonprofit sector includes strategic and organizational planning. He has worked for a number of K-12 educational nonprofits and youth development organizations. Other clients have included major global foundations and aging and health care organizations. Prior to joining Bridgespan, Kramer was a Managing Director of Oliver Wyman, where he led the firm's Operations practice unit. He also ran the firm's Asian operations from Hong Kong and built the firm's organization strategy practice in Europe while based in London. While living internationally, Kramer worked with organizations promoting small business formation and local economic development. Kramer received a B.A. in economics from Williams College and obtained an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School.

RAFAEL LÓPEZ, Associate Director for Talent and Leadership Development, The Annie E. Casey Foundation

Rafael López is the Associate Director for Talent and Leadership Development at the Annie E. Casey Foundation. Prior to joining the Foundation, López served as the President and Chief Executive Officer of The Family League of Baltimore City, Inc. and a member of the Baltimore City Mayor's Cabinet; Executive Director of the City of Los Angeles Commission for Children, Youth and Their Families; Deputy Director of the City and County of San Francisco Department of Children, Youth, and Their Families; Senior Deputy for Health and Human Services for Los Angeles County Supervisor Gloria Molina; and Founding Executive Director of First 5 Santa Cruz County. In 1999, López became the youngest person in the City's history to serve on the Watsonville City Council. He was sponsored by the Packard Foundation to serve as a fellow at Stanford University's Center for Social Innovation and awarded an Annie E. Casey Foundation Children and Family National Fellowship. López is an alumnus of Vassar College and the University of California Santa Cruz where he graduated with honors in American Studies, and he received a MA in Public Administration from Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government where he was named a Lucius N. Littauer Fellow.

GAIL J. MCGOVERN, President and Chief Executive Officer, American Red Cross

Gail J. McGovern joined the American Red Cross as President and Chief Executive Officer on April 8, 2008. Along with overseeing responses to several high-profile disasters, McGovern has initiated steps to invigorate the \$3.3 billion organization, including balancing its budget and streamlining its operations. She also serves as a member of President Barack Obama's Management Advisory Board (PMAB). Prior to joining the Red Cross, McGovern was a faculty member at the Harvard Business School and served as President of Fidelity Personal Investments, a unit of Fidelity Investments. She was also Executive Vice President for the Consumer Markets Division at AT&T. She earned a BA from Johns Hopkins University and an MBA from Columbia University, and has since been recognized as alumna of the year from both universities. McGovern is currently a member of the board of trustees of Johns Hopkins University and the board of directors of DTE Energy. McGovern was recognized by *Fortune Magazine* in 2000 and 2001 as one of the top 50 most powerful women in corporate America.

JOHN RICE, Founder and Chief Executive Officer, Management Leadership for Tomorrow

John Rice is Founder and CEO of Management Leadership for Tomorrow (MLT, www.ML4T.org), a national non-profit organization that equips under-represented minorities with the skills, career roadmap, coaching and door-opening relationships that are critical to become high-impact leaders in corporations, nonprofits and entrepreneurial ventures. Prior to MLT, Rice was an executive with the National Basketball Association, where he served as Managing Director of NBA Japan and as Director of Marketing for Latin America. Rice also spent four years with the Walt Disney Company. John serves on the Board of Trustees of Yale University, the Board of Visitors of Duke University's Sanford School of Public Policy, and on President Obama's Advisory Board on Historically Black Colleges. He is the lead director of Walker & Dunlop, a leading publicly traded real estate finance company, and he serves on a number of non-profit boards including the American Management Association, LIFT, and the National Center for Civil & Human Rights. Rice received his MBA from Harvard Business School and his BA with honors from Yale.

JOHN RYAN, President, Center for Creative Leadership

John R. Ryan is President of the Center for Creative Leadership (CCL), a top-ranked, global provider of executive education that develops better leaders through its exclusive focus on leadership education and research. A retired U.S. Navy Vice Admiral, Ryan joined CCL's Board of Governors in 2002 and became President in 2007. From 2005 to 2007, he served as Chancellor of the State University of New York (SUNY). Previously, Ryan served as President of the State University of New York Maritime College and as Interim President of the University at Albany. From 1998 to 2002, Ryan was Superintendent (President) of the U.S. Naval Academy, winning widespread praise for his focus on academics, strategic planning and fund-raising. A former Navy pilot, Ryan commanded squadrons, wings and forces in Asia, Europe and the Middle East during a 35-year career in the military. Ryan serves on the Board of Directors for Cablevision (Bethpage, N.Y.) and CIT Group Inc. He is also a member of the U.S. Naval Academy Foundation Board. Ryan received a B.S. from the U.S. Naval Academy, an M.S. in Administration from George Washington University, and completed the program for Senior Executives in National and International Security at Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government.

THOMAS SCHICK, Executive Vice President, Corporate and External Affairs, American Express Company

Thomas Schick is Executive Vice President for Corporate and External Affairs at American Express Company. He is a member of the company's Operating Committee and Global Management Team, and serves as Chairman of the American Express Foundation. Schick joined American Express from Shearson Lehman Brothers, then American Express' investment banking and brokerage subsidiary, where he was Senior Vice President for Corporate Affairs and Communications for nine years. Prior to joining the American Express family of companies, Schick served as Associate Dean for External Relations at New York University's Stern School of Business Administration. Schick is Co-Chairman of the Board of the International Rescue Committee and a Director and member of the Executive Committee of the U.S.-India Business Council. He is the author of the *New York State Constitutional Convention of 1915*, a book published by the National Municipal League. Schick holds a PhD in Public Administration from New York University.

PAUL SCHMITZ, CEO, Public Allies

Paul Schmitz is the author of *Everyone Leads: Building Leadership from the Community Up* (Jossey Bass/Wiley, 2011) and national CEO of Public Allies, where he has worked since 1993. Public Allies advances new leadership to strengthen communities, nonprofits, and civic participation across the country. To date, Public Allies has identified over 4,400 diverse young leaders with a passion to make a difference in their communities and helped them begin careers working for community and social change. Schmitz was a member of the Obama-Biden Transition Team, where he worked on the nonprofit, national service, and social innovation agenda, and he was appointed by President Obama to the White House Council on Community Solutions. In addition, Schmitz is a board member of Independent Sector, co-chairs Voices for National Service, and is a faculty member of the Asset-Based Community Development Institute. Schmitz was a Next Generation Leadership Fellow with The Rockefeller Foundation, received *Fast Company Magazine's* Social Capitalist Award, and was recognized by *The Nonprofit Times* as one of the fifty most influential nonprofit leaders in the country. Schmitz is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

MIKAELA SELIGMAN, Vice President, Nonprofit and Philanthropic Leadership and Practice, Independent Sector

Mikaela Seligman, Vice President of Nonprofit and Philanthropic Leadership and Practice at Independent Sector (IS), directs IS efforts to strengthen leadership, accountability, and effectiveness in nonprofit organizations of all sizes and missions. Her career includes co-founding The OCL Group, which engages creative approaches to addressing organizations' toughest leadership challenges. Seligman taught leadership at George Mason University and St. Mary's College and has provided consultation to leaders in international and domestic nonprofits, corporations, foundations and governments. Seligman was a Program Officer in the early years of AmeriCorps and Vice President and COO for the largest coordinator of volunteer services in Greater Washington. She was a charter corps member of Teach for America. Seligman holds an M.P.A. from Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government and a certificate in leadership coaching from Georgetown University.

JAMES SHEPARD, Chief Executive Officer, AchieveMission

James Shepard is the Chief Executive Officer of AchieveMission, a consulting organization working to dramatically reshape the way the nonprofit sector perceives and practices human capital management. Shepard has been scaling organizations, consulting, and building technology to enhance human capital management for more than 20 years. Previously, as Chief Operating Officer and National Vice President for Programs, he built Taproot Foundation's nonprofit consulting practice into one of the largest capacity building organizations in the country. Earlier, Shepard held senior roles at several high growth software companies that supported superior human capital management in the areas of learning and development, online community, and knowledge management; three of these companies were successfully acquired or taken public. Shepard began his career as a strategy consultant with JSA International/A.T. Kearney. He earned his MBA from the Kellogg Graduate School of Management and his BA cum laude from Georgetown University.

WILLIAM SPRIGGS, Assistant Secretary for Policy, U.S. Department of Labor

William Spriggs was nominated by President Barack Obama as Assistant Secretary for Policy and was confirmed by the Senate on October 21, 2009. At the time of his nomination, Spriggs was Chair of the Department and a professor of Economics at Howard University in Washington, D.C., and chaired both the Independent Healthcare Trust for UAW Retirees of the Ford Motor Company and the Health and Welfare Trust of UAW Retirees of the Dana Corporation. From 1988 to 2004, he was Executive Director of the National Urban League's Institute for Opportunity and Equality. During the Clinton Administration, Spriggs led the staff of the National Commission for Employment Policy from 1993 to 1994 and worked at the Department of Commerce and the Small Business Administration from 1997 to 1998. He also served as a senior economist for the Democratic staff of the Joint Economic Committee of the U.S. Congress from 1994 to 1997. Spriggs is a past-board member and President of the National Economic Association and served as a Board member of the National Academy of Social Insurance. In 2006, he was elected a fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration. Most recently, he served on the boards of the Eastern Economic Association, the Association for Public Policy Analysis and Management, the National Employment Law Project, the National Committee for the Preservation of Social Security and Medicare, and the National Advisory Council of Corporate Voices for Working Families. Spriggs taught six years at Norfolk State University in Virginia and two years at North Carolina A & T State University in Greensboro. He graduated *cum laude* from Williams College and earned a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

DONNA STARK, Vice President for Talent Management & Leadership Development, The Annie E. Casey Foundation

Donna Stark is the Vice President for Talent and Leadership Development at the Annie E. Casey Foundation, a private charitable organization dedicated to helping build better futures for disadvantaged children in the United States. Prior to her appointment as Vice President, Stark was the Director of Leadership Development at the Foundation. From 1997-2001, Stark worked in Planning and Development where she coordinated the work of the unit and focused on the planning and implementation of the Foundation's Five-Year plan. Prior to her work in Planning and Development, she led the Foundation's comprehensive state level human services systems reform initiative. Before joining the Foundation in 1993, Stark was the first State Director of the Children and Family Systems Reform

Initiative for the State of Maryland. Stark taught at the Ohio State University and the University of Maryland and directed several private, non-profit organizations that provided both community-based and residential services to children and adults. Stark received her Ph.D. in Counseling and Human Development from the Ohio State University.

TRISH TCHUME, Director, Young Nonprofit Professionals Network

Trish Tchume is the first-ever Director of the Young Nonprofit Professionals Network (YNPN). Prior to becoming Director in 2011, Tchume served as Director of Civic Engagement for the Building Movement Project and as a Campus Organizer, a Community Outreach Manager, and the Director of Training for Idealist.org, all following years spent doing community development work via city government and academia. Tchume has received a number of awards and recognitions for her engagement of young nonprofit professionals including her selection for the inaugural class of Independent Sector NGen Fellows in 2009.

JAMES L. WEINBERG, Founder and Chief Executive Officer, Commongood Careers

James Weinberg is Founder and Chief Executive Officer of Commongood Careers, a retained search firm that enables the nation's most innovative nonprofits to recruit and hire talented leaders at every level of their organizations. Concurrently, he also serves as the Co-Founder and Chairman of AchieveMission (formerly Talent Initiative), a nonprofit consulting firm that is dedicated to enhancing human capital management throughout the social sector. Previously, Weinberg served as the National Development Director at BELL (Building Educated Leaders for Life). Prior to this, Weinberg served as the Executive Director of the Homeless Children's Education Fund, where he worked to ensure that children who are homeless have equal access to the same educational opportunities and experiences as their peers. Weinberg is the national board chair for Emerging Practitioners in Philanthropy, a council co-chair for Reimagining Service, a member of Independent Sector's N-Gen program committee, and a member of the ServiceNation and America Forward coalitions. James earned a Master's Degree in Management and Public Policy with highest honors from Carnegie Mellon University, is an alumnus of the Coro Fellows Program in Public Affairs, and holds a Bachelor's Degree in Psychology from Tufts University where he graduated *summa cum laude* and *Phi Beta Kappa*.
