

Seminar on Policy Priorities for *Manufacturing* in the 21st Century



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Manufacturing in America is at a crossroads: the most severe recession since the 1930s and increasingly sophisticated global competition make for a constant challenge to compete and grow. Yet the past few years have shown the resilience of firms in this sector. The global terms of trade now are shifting in favor of domestic firms, helping expand exports and positioning manufacturing to lead the recovery. What policies are needed to reinforce these positive trends and help strengthen manufacturing for the future?

These questions and concerns are the basis for the "Aspen Seminar on Policy Priorities for Manufacturing in the 21st Century," the first in an annual series of invitation-only events at the scenic Aspen Institute campus for CEOs and Board Members of manufacturing firms. Unlike many such events, the Aspen seminar, building on the Aspen tradition of deep reflection and consensus building, will be a highly interactive discussion. Limited to 30 participants, the dialogue will focus on the most important issues facing manufacturers and be led by industry leaders.

The consensus which emerges from dialogue will be summarized, published, and promoted by Aspen Program Director, Tom Duesterberg, who led the Manufacturers Alliance/MAPI for twelve years and before that served as Assistant Secretary at the U.S.



Department of Commerce and as a think tank leader. Discussion leaders include Jay Timmons of NAM, Jim Owens (invited), formerly of Caterpillar, David Chavern of the U.S. Chamber, Stephen Gold of MAPI, and Steve McKnight of the National Science Foundation. A keynote address on the future of higher education and partnerships with manufacturers will be given by Greg Cappelli, Co-CEO of the Apollo Group, parent of the University of Phoenix.
