A former director of community strategies for the Humboldt Area Foundation, Kathy has also served as the chairperson for the California Stewardship Network and has spoken across the nation on issues of rural economic and community development.

Karen Jacobson is Executive Director of the Randolph County Housing Authority (RCHA) in Elkins, West Virginia, where she also manages housing development projects and serves on the boards of two nonprofit housing groups. With an MBA from Boston University and a WV Contractor License in General Building, her experience includes leadership roles in the fields of community economic development, lending and social services.

Mable Starks is President and CEO of the Mississippi Action for Community Education (MACE) in Greenville, Mississippi. In October 2009, she initiated the MACE YouthBuild program, with the goals of providing training and support to young people in the Delta as they first get a GED or high school diploma, and then placement in a career-starting job or higher education. She is also the owner of the Delta Arts Gallery and Craftorium in downtown Greenville.

Deontay White is a Construction Trainer for the MACE YouthBuild Program. Deontay grew up in Ruleville, a small town in Sunflower County, Mississippi – and the home of civil rights leader Fannie Lou Hamer. Deontay is a MACE YouthBuild graduate. He was so successful in the program that MACE brought him on as a construction trainer for other YouthBuild participants.

Shawna Campbell-Daniels, an enrolled Coeur d' Alene Tribe member, is the State Tribal Education Partnership (STEP) Manager for the Coeur d'Alene Tribe Department of Education in Plummer, Idaho. The focus of her work is creating culturally relevant curriculum, teacher professional development, organic family & community engagement systems, and equitable education policy initiatives. She is currently a Doctoral student in the College of Education at the University of Idaho with a focus on Indigenous research.

The Researcher

Andrew Schaefer is a Vulnerable Families Research Scientist at the University of New Hampshire's Carsey School of Public Policy. Andrew's work focuses on poverty, the social safety net, and women and work – including policies and programs that support low-income and other working families.
