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Brad R. Fulton is an associate professor in the O’Neill School of Public and Environmental Affairs at Indiana University. His research draws on organizational theory and network analysis to examine the social, political, and economic impact of community-based organizations. Fulton directs the [National Study of Community Organizing](#)—a multi-level study that examines the causes and consequences of racial, socioeconomic, and religious diversity within grassroots advocacy organizations. He coleads the [Observing Civic Engagement project](#)—a field study that uses an innovative data collection technique, known as systematic social observation, to analyze the internal dynamics of organizations.

Fulton is also the co-director of the [National Study of Congregations’ Economic Practices](#)—a multimethod study that analyzes how religious congregations receive, manage, and spend their financial resources. He co-authored the award-winning book [A Shared Future: Faith-Based Organizing for Racial Equity and Ethical Democracy](#) (University of Chicago Press) and his research is regularly covered by major media outlets including the New York Times, Washington Post, and Religion News Service. The courses Fulton teaches include [Diversity & Inequality](#) and [Nonprofit Management & Leadership](#); both of which can be found on Apple Podcasts. Fulton earned degrees from U.C. Berkeley, University of Chicago, and Duke University, and he is an editorial board member for the journal *Sociology of Religion*, a faculty affiliate of IU’s Islamic Studies Program, and a Religion & Society Program Fellow at the Aspen Institute.
