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BACKGROUND

1.1 Commissioning of the Study

[TeamSnap](#) has been in existence since 2009 and its primary mission is to streamline the way teams and organizations manage sports and group activities. More than 19,000 sport organizations and over 25 million coaches, administrators, players, and parents utilize TeamSnap solutions for communication, scheduling, payment collection, registration, real-time game sharing and much more. The Aspen Institute's [Sports & Society Program](#) has been in existence since 2013 and its primary mission is to convene leaders, foster dialogue, and inspire solutions that help sport serve the public interest, with a focus through its [Project Play initiative](#) on the development of healthy children and communities. The program has successfully provided a venue for thought leadership where knowledge can be deepened, and breakthrough strategies explored.

Together, TeamSnap and the Sports & Society Program wished to assess the national state of youth sports in 2022 and sought out a partnership with Dr. Travis Dorsch, associate professor and founding director of the [Families in Sport Lab](#) at Utah State University and Dr. Jordan Blazo, associate professor and co-founder of the [Minds in Motion Laboratory](#) at Louisiana Tech University. The study described in this report utilized an internationally representative sample of youth sport parents in the United States and Canada. In all, 2027 adults whose children were participating regularly in youth sports provided data to the researchers. The single time-point study sought to address the behaviors, experiences, and expectations of parents in youth sport, paying particular attention to the trust parents had in their children's youth sport coaches. In this report, parents are defined as the biological, adoptive, or otherwise regular caregivers of a child. This included mothers and fathers, step parents, aunts and uncles, godparents, foster parents, and grandparents who served as primary caregivers.

The survey, hosted and distributed by Qualtrics International, Inc. in Provo, Utah, was a study designed by key stakeholders at TeamSnap and the Sport & Society Program, through scientific consultation with Drs. Dorsch and Blazo. The initial section of the survey asked parents to answer sociodemographic items about themselves, their families, and their children. The second section asked parents to summarize the sport participation behaviors of their children in sport. The third section asked parents to rate their children's coaches on key indicators of trust in organized sport. Data were collected online between Sept. 22 and Oct. 9, 2022.

This report extends knowledge on the state of youth sports in the United States and Canada during the COVID-19 pandemic (see report [HERE](#)). The results presented herein will be used to guide TeamSnap programming and future Sports & Society Program initiatives. Although wide-ranging, this report is not comprehensive; additional analyses are being conducted by Drs. Dorsch and Blazo at the discretion of TeamSnap and the Sports & Society Program. TAKE HOME: Families whose parents participated in the survey represented all 50 states, as well as the District of Columbia and the US Virgin Islands. The three least represented states (Montana, Vermont, and Wyoming) each had one respondent. TAKE HOME: The 2027 parent respondents reported gross annual incomes ranging from less than \$2,000 to \$200,000+. Of note, from the 1990 participants who provided a response to this question, the median household income in the United States and Canada fell in the \$50,000-\$74,999 range. This is roughly in line with the national averages in the United States (\$68,703, [US Census Bureau](#), 2020) and Canada (\$87,930, [Statista](#), 2021).
